# Course Description:

Prerequisite: GEMS496. Restriction: Must be in the Gemstone program with senior standing in a research team.

This is the fifth of six seminars during which Gemstone students carry out interdisciplinary research with the guidance of a faculty mentor. The team further develops its website. Also they will prepare and present the team project in the poster session of Undergraduate Research Day.

## Course Expectations:

- Gemstone expects that students will gather information, assess knowledge, use logic to explore assumptions, and consider implications. This process requires students to understand their own perspectives and attentively listen to the arguments of others, thereby transforming their understanding of themselves and of the world around them.
- Gemstone challenges students to identify, critically examine, and engage in complex ethical dilemmas in their scholarly and personal lives as well as evaluate their implications for the lives of others.
- Gemstone encourages students to welcome new challenges, explore risk and understand consequence, consider multiple perspectives, and engage through real-world experiments. This experience supports understanding of success through failure. Through this process, Honors College graduates are able to apply the lessons learned and foster lifelong learning.

#### Goals and Objectives:

- Finish data collection and be close to completing data analysis by the end of the school year.
- Produce an initial draft of the first three chapters of the thesis (Introduction, Literature Review, Methodology).
- Obtain feedback on the draft of the first three chapters of the thesis from expert contacts/future discussants and your mentor and librarian.

- Revise chapters 1, 2, & 3 based on feedback.
- Present a poster at Undergraduate Research Day in April.
- Keep team website updated.
- Check in with the team's librarian.
- Continue to identify scholarly meetings, conferences and/or journals that could be a forum for the research. Consider making a proposal for a meeting or conference.
- Continue to identify possible funding sources. Apply for appropriate grants.
